BEAR ESSENTIALS

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AGROUND As we were reminded by the Channel Pilots, talk in January, it's pretty easy to run aground in the Bristol Channel and the best way to get off again is to retrace your approach. I have touched bottom on a few occasions, leaving the barrage at low water making it very important to follow the buoyage system until out of the Wrack channel. A friend recently ignored this and promptly ran aground in a bilge keeler on a falling tide and remained stranded for a couple of hours before re-floating in settled conditions. There is also on record, 30 sailing vessels at anchor in the 19th Century, going aground in one night between Penarth Head and Lavernock Point, when the wind suddenly changed from S.W. to E. Another friend found a shingle bank on Sully Causeway and was neaped for 5 days in his long keeled boat. He held it up right by setting anchors from the masthead finally getting off by careening. There was an occasion when I set the legs on my Jaguar 3O, Summerlove with a shark fin keel, in the outer harbour at Illfracombe, only to have the Port tubular leg buckle under, due to soft sand. My solution on that occasion was to retire to the yacht club and observe the masthead through a pint beer glass until the tide came back. A few boats went over to Weston with me for the night and tied up to the club dolphins with Farrcical, a fin keel on the inside. High water was at 11pm and we settled down O.K. after a little pounding. The next morning the rest of the boats departed, but I was still aground, neaped fortunately. With the aid of passers-by I was hauled astern into deeper water and away. On a trip to Ireland we had stopped off in Saundersfoot in a long keel boat of 13 tons and had been advised by the harbour master that there was a fresh hard sandy bottom. The boat was backed in and laid Port side to, to the harbour wall, the skipper said there was no need to set a mast preventer as she had a natural list to port. Unfortunately she settled by the head and the large fender forward pushed the boat over to starboard. Fortunately she came to rest clear of the other vessels in the harbour and came up on the next tide. On a trip from Uphill to Watchet in company with Indulgence, Farrcical made a late entry into the old harbour and managed to get through the entrance before running aground some 15m from the harbour wall. To make sure the mast lay clear of the wall I managed to re align her and use my weight to lean her to port and thus avoid all obstructions, she came to rest on hard mud at 75 degrees and lifted gently on the returning tide. I did nt return until the marina was built.. I have used Jackson's Bay Barry on occasion to dry out but it is important to set anchors astern so that you can pull off in the rising tide and avoid being pushed up the beach. JOHN WOOD.

However, there is currently a move to encourage and promote more traditional rigged sailing locally and I wonder whether the club would be interested in including a 'gaffer's' activity in an Open Day or Regatta this summer, or perhaps supporting or hosting a regatta for traditional boats. I know there are a few at the club having seen a Dauntless, Memory and Morecambe Bay Prawner sailing, amongst others. And others may come from further afield.

I should say that the intention is not to embark on a recruiting drive for OGA members, although they would always be welcome. It is simply to try to encourage it's main aim- and that is to promote traditionally rigged sailing boats. At the same time, if we were able to draw a few people and boats together I am sure it would certainly benefit the club too.

OUR VERY OWN HERO! During the Angling Section competition held on the 22nd December, Gareth Davies, skipper of the vessel "Mary H" overheard a MAYDAY Distress call from another fishing boat. Being unsure as to whether the Coastguard had heard it, he quite rightly undertook to broadcast a MAYDAY RELAY call to the Coastguard. They in turn responded and Gareth became the controlling station, co-ordinating the rescue. The boat in distress was the "Fleur de Lys", which had been taking in water and was almost completely sunk when Gareth arrived. There were four fishermen clinging to the upturned bow and two others, wearing flotation suits, were floating away on the tide. A further boat, the "Jo-Jo" had also arrived and undertook to rescue the four clinging to the hull, whilst Gareth sped after the two men floating away. Helped by his son Robert and his grandson Jason, with some difficulty, they eventually managed to pull them aboard.

There is no doubt that if not for both Gareth's and "Jo-Jo"s prompt action these men would probably have drowned, as the water was very cold. The casualties were taken to an ambulance waiting at the barrage and whisked off to the Heath Hospital where they were treated for hypothermia. I was fishing with John Gittins aboard Sanibel, a good few miles away and we heard the radio traffic between Gareth and the Coastguard and he is to be highly commended on his confident radio procedures. He never put a foot wrong! Very well done Gareth. B. Reels.

THE CONTINUING STORY OF THE PENARTH MOTORBOAT AND SAILING CLUB (DON'T FORGET, THIS WAS WRITTEN IN 1965 BY RON ALEXANDER) CHAPTER III1. THE CLEBE STREET ERA

The Club Reconstituted. At the end of hostilities various domestic, recreational and social activities everywhere were stimulated, and following this urge, a number of old members decided to call a Meeting to reconstitute the Club. A meeting attended by 50 ex members and interested people was held at the Penarth Conservative Club on July 19th, 1945, when Bill Lewis was elected Commodore and Ray Hope Honorary Secretary. Members returned to the Royal Hotel, to an upstairs room which was in bad need of repair. It was not long before the Committee decided that they should make a move. In 1947 an advert appeared in the local paper that a house and shop at 81 Clebe Street was available at a price of £500. Resources totalled about £20, and in the commencement it could not see the way clear of purchasing. Everyone realised that its location was not very satisfactory for a yacht club but at least we could meet when we pleased and eventually could have a bar. The late Harold Dunleavie, who was a member and close friend of Walter Oestroicher, offered to lend us £500 free of interest, providing we renewed the lease, that had about 15 years to run. The Committee gratefully accepted this offer and it was confirmed at an E.G.M. held at the Queens Cafe, Penarth, on October 8th, 1947, Len Walker paying a deposit of £5. to retain the premises in the meantime. We proceeded to repair the premises that were in a ropey state. We built a bar, but it was a year or so before we were able to use it in the way which had been intended. The Clubhouse was the contact point and members used to retire to the Albion Hotel, ably let by Bill Lewis. Beer was in short supply and for a time Breweries would not open new accounts. At times, flagons were brought in and sold over the bar plus a few coppers. Crosswells of Cardiff, was the first firm to supply us and we also used to obtain about 2 Firkins per week of Whitbread's Dark that was sent by rail. Negotiations were started for the acquisition of moorings at Ely Harbour and Ferry Road and were successfully concluded in July 1946. The work in this connection was carried out by E. N. Coward and H. Waller. Our membership was increasing and the old Club, with its limited capacity was often full up. The bar was run at this time by the Committee and our percentage was not very good, but we managed to repay the loan in just over two years. Quote from Club Minutes, 1948 "It was agreed that Committee Members on bar duties should refrain from the act of smoking whilst serving drinks: There was perfect harmony in the Club, its tightness in space was a contributory factor.
